

## Corps Of Engineers Announces Project

WASHINGTON (ANF)—The largest civil works contract ever signed by the Army Corps of Engineers has been awarded for construction work on the Snake River in the state of Washington. Totalling nearly \$72 million, the contract tops the previous record of \$70.5 million for work on the Columbia River.

Under the new contract, the last of four multi-purpose locks and dams will be built on the lower Snake River. The completed project will extend navigation to Lewiston, Idaho, nearly 500 miles from the sea. In addition, it will provide a large volume of hydro-electric power

for the region. **Already In Operation**  
One of the other three lock-and-dam combinations is already completed and in operation. The other two are in various stages of construction. **Vinnell - Mannix - Fuller-Dillingham of Alhambra, Calif.**, was the successful bidder for the record-setting contract. **Record Holder**  
The Army Engineers also noted that the largest military contract they ever awarded was for more than \$121 million. It covered construction of the launcher and launch-control facilities at the Minuteman missile site near Grand Forks, North Dakota.

## Two New Civil Service Exams Announced This Week For Technicians

Two new examinations were announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission this week.

One offers young people thinking about their first job an opportunity to become technical assistants to engineers and scientists in many professional fields. A written test is required. In addition six months of pertinent experience or graduation from high school is qualifying for grade GS-2 (paying \$3,680 a year). An additional year of experience or education above the high school level is required for GS-3 (paying \$4,005 a year). Interested applicants should fill Card Form 5000-AB with the Board of U. S. ## 'Hostile Fire' Pay Is Available For GI's

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Department of Defense's new "hostile fire" pay directive opens the door for payment of \$55 monthly to some 54,000 U. S. service personnel in the Republic of Viet Nam.

About one-fourth of this total was covered in an earlier directive. Now, all personnel not specifically excluded by the unified or specified commander concerned are entitled to the special pay.

This means that some 27,000 Navy personnel aboard Seventh Fleet vessels may qualify, although policy has been to award it only to certain personnel such as aircraft pilots flying missions and small boat operators and crewmen operating in coastal areas.

No change is noted in provisions for Dominican Republic service, where pay entitlements are earned by those killed or wounded in hostile fire, explosion of hostile mines, or other hostile actions. **Six monthly payments** are authorized for widows whose husbands lost their lives in such actions. This special pay is in addition to the normal six month gratuity pay for widows, as long as both these benefits do not exceed \$3,000. **The casualty toll** in the Dominican Republic reached 28 dead and 158 wounded June 23, according to DOD figures. Most of these casualties resulted from hostile actions, an official said, with some being attributed to other causes.

## Life Saving Vaccine Derived From Army Soldier's Blood

WASHINGTON (ANF) — A recent crisis at the District of Columbia General Hospital highlighted the important role played by the Army and other Armed Forces in producing a life-saving medicine.

When a woman suffering from smallpox arrived at the hospital, it was necessary to protect other patients who had come in contact with her. The special drug that was used is derived from the blood donations of Armed Forces recruits.

Called Vaccinia Immune Globulin, or V-I-G, it is used to combat rare and deadly diseases, especially smallpox, in emergency situations where it is necessary to immunize people who are too ill to be vaccinated in the normal manner.

The Red Cross is the only producer of V-I-G in this country. It's derived from the blood of humans who have recently been vaccinated against smallpox. Thus Armed Forces recruits are an ideal source and, in fact, the Red Cross relies on their donations for its entire V-I-G production. **The last blood collection** for the medicine was at the Army's Ft. Knox, Ky. Plans are underway for collections at Ft. Jackson, S. C., and Ft. Dix, N. J., both Army Basic Combat Training Centers, as well as Lackland Air Force Base, Texas.

## Military Transport Service Will Become MAC In January

SCOTT AFB, Ill. (AFPS) — Beginning Jan. 1, 1966, the Military Air Transport Service (MATS) will officially be known as the Military Air Command (MAC), according to a MATS news release.

Representative L. Mendel Rivers, D-S. C., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, who introduced the bill calling for the name change, said it is more descriptive of the true function performed by MATS and provides recognition of its vital mission.

"The Congress," Representative Rivers said, "and the public are aware of the magnificent performance in Operation 'Big Lift' and other similar opera-

tions in recent years." Operation Big Lift was the 1964 exercise when MATS shifted 15,000 Army personnel from Texas to Europe in just over 63 hours. **In its report to Congress**, the committee praise MATS as an "essential arm of national defense" and added that "... virtually every element of the military services is in one way or the other dependent on MATS."

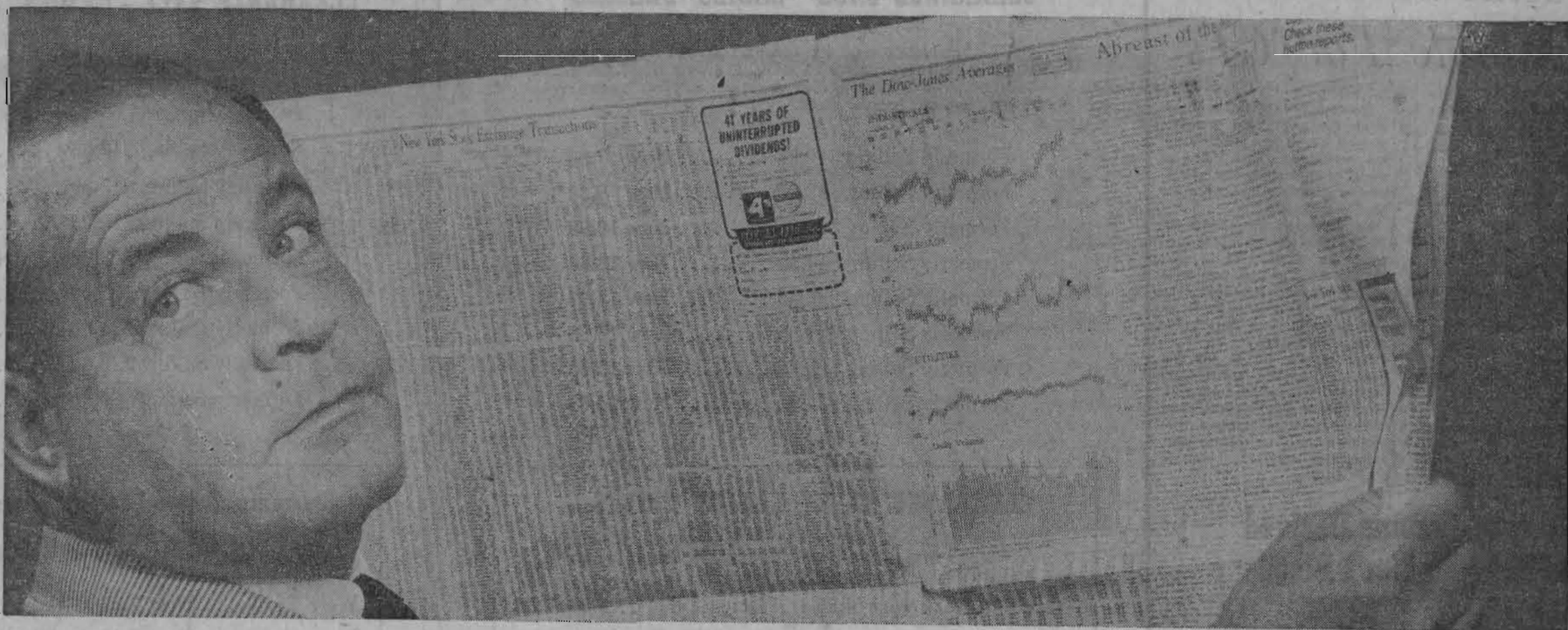
### Air Command

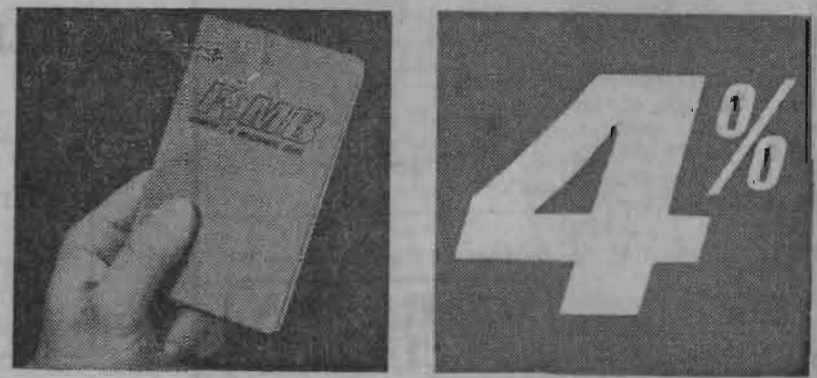

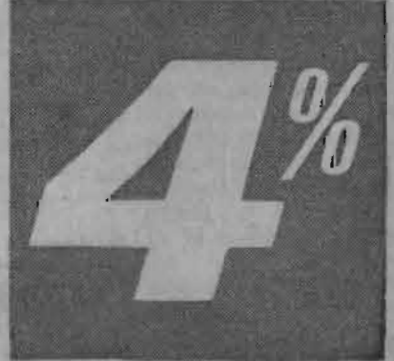
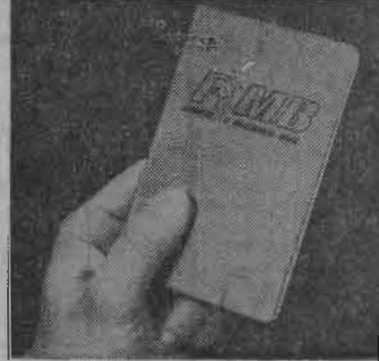
