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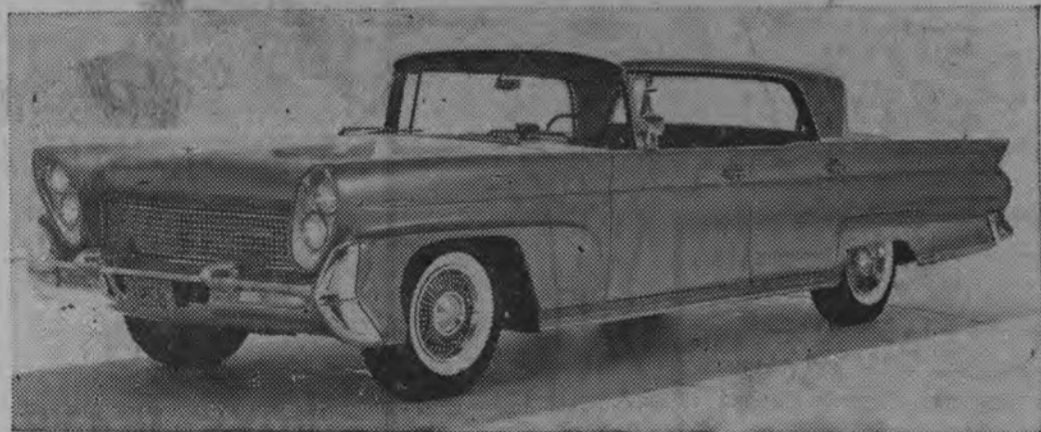

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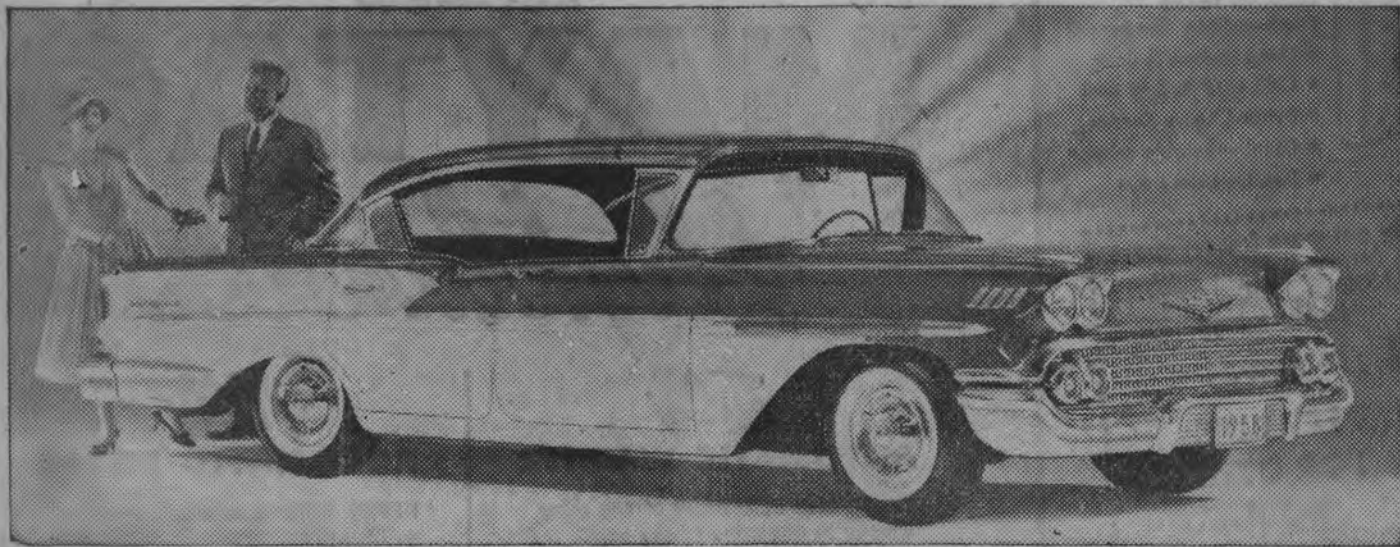
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Teen Talk

stands for today has been built around the spirit of those who are fortunate enough to others who are not. I ask that each civilian and military person at WSPG consider whether he or she is able to donate something to help someone less fortunate, and at the same time, help to maintain the prestige of White Sands Proving Ground. After you do this, see your key man. If you do this, I am sure we will reach our goal of \$16,000.

"At the risk of being repetitious, I think it is necessary to reiterate several points about our current United Fund Drive.

"During the Combined Charity campaign which ended last spring, you were promised that that drive would be the only one conducted during the calendar year of 1957. This statement was made in good faith by the people who made it to you. However, at that time a regulation was in the process which outlined the method of fund raising within the Army establishment.

"This regulation prescribes that only three campaigns could be conducted in any Army establishment during any year. These three drives were for the American National Red Cross, United Fund campaign, and National Health Agency campaign." In the event the American Red Cross allied or federated with the United Fund campaign, only two drives would have to be conducted.

"This same regulation specified that the campaign for the United Fund would be conducted during the fall of each year, and that the campaign for the National Health Agency would be conducted during a six-week period dur-

ing the months of January and February.

"I would like to point out that the United Fund campaign currently under way and the National Health Agency campaign which will be conducted here during the period Jan. 15 to Feb. 28 will be the only campaigns allowable until the same period of next year.

"I believe the drive, without added incentives to induce people to contribute, depends entirely on the generosity of WSPG personnel. Participating in the drive are:

American Red Cross, Salvation Army, New Mexico Boy's Ranch, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

"The Dona Ana County 'target' is \$47,366. A concerted effort will be conducted throughout the community from Nov. 10 through Nov. 23."

Army to Draft 7,000 Between Dec. 1 and 12

WASHINGTON (APPS)— The Defense Department, for the third consecutive month, has asked Selective Service to induct 7,000 men for the Army in December.

skilled and special trained mechanics. The erector itself has 10 electric motors, two generators and a gasoline engine. The boom structure of the Corporal servicer is hydraulically operated.

On the other hand, maintenance of some special equipment such as the Honest John launcher, which is mounted on a modified five-ton truck chassis, is relatively simple.

Sgt. Troy L. Maeress inspects incoming equipment to the shop for repair to determine repair needed and then inspects it for adequacy of repairs before releasing it from the shop.

For equipment in the field that cannot be brought to the shop, the section provides emergency service. A two-man team with maintenance tools on an equipment-mounted truck is dispatched to the site of the breakdown.

Sgt. Donald M. Keller operates the consolidated motor pool for STD which performs organizational maintenance for 67 vehicles and averages 1,050 dispatches a month.

Drawing and specifications section, under the direction of Mrs. Lorraine Nordgren, provides support to most agencies in supplying engineering drawings, specifications and related materials pertaining to all guided missile systems tested at the proving ground. This service furnished lists of drawings of individual parts from the whole unit down to the last bolt. The drawings are filed and are available to all post agencies.

Official Ordnance Corps part numbers, used throughout missile systems in the Corps, are used on all drawings and specifications.

Over a period of six months, the section has handled an average of 1,600 drawings a day and has more than 300,000 reproducible drawings on file.

Reproductions of drawings are

made upon request. However, the section operates on the principles of a library. There is a viewing room and material may be taken from the files and used in the viewing room.

Mrs. Beverly Kenyon is chief clerk for classified materials which are filed in a separate area arranged for maximum security. Classified items are available for authorized personnel.

New Type Matador Successfully Tested

The first flight test of a new version of the Matador missile has been termed successful by the Air Force Missile Development Center at Holloman Air Force Base.

The new version of the TM-61B Matador has been fitted with guidance equipment to allow greater control of the missile in flight, and has been designated TM-76A. The new version is in overseas service.

end of World War II to help develop this country's guided missile program. He has more than 25 inventions patented or in the process of being patented and many have application to the guided missile field.

Two of his patents processed at WSPG are for liquid valves and for an oscillation of natural frequency amplitude indicator. The amplitude indicator is a testing instrument to measure vibrations and may be used in connection with work on guided missiles.

James D. Perdue, another Electronic scientist here, has an invention for an improved data reduction device used to present tele-

metry data from guided missiles in flight.

William H. Fickes has a patent pending on a pinwheel slot antenna. The improved antenna is designed to handle more than one frequency on a common antenna and will aid in the reception of radio signal from guided missiles.

Seiler lives at 2522 Richmond St., El Paso. James D. Perdue resides on Rt. 1, Las Cruces, and Fickes lives at 1417 Boston Drive, Las Cruces.

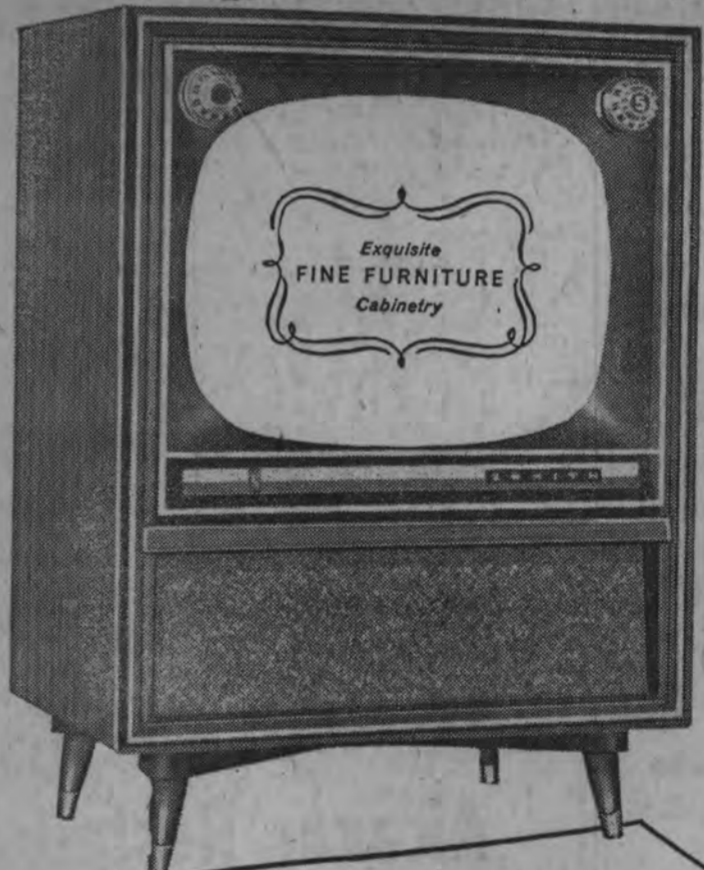
