Ordered by God's direct command to bring a tithe into the storehouse, we rush off to spend God's tithe on the things we want for

But let us remember that if Jonah ever walked the streets of Tarshish he would walk them contrary to God's will and he would be outside of God's plan

There were just two cities on his map; there was the city of God's will, Nineveh; and there was the city of Tarshish clearly outside of the circle of God's will. He could not go to both. Which would it be?


